- 1. Call to Order & Roll Call – Kim Benjamin – Quorum and meeting called to order at 6:15pm. Kim Benjamin introduced some of the guests present at the meeting.

Martin Farfan asked Michael Fong when the funds for the permanent Los Angeles State Historic Park (old Corn Fields) will become available, Michael Fong said he was not sure, funds will be coming from State of California so they are working thru the process, probably 1 to ½ years. Just had the first community meeting.

Kim asked Michael Fong status of the pocket park in Solano Canyon: Per Michael Fong it's at the Park & Rec's Committee and on the Council 5 Index. They are doing their analysis of the land and it looks very positive. Real Estate unit of Parks & Recs. Kim Benjamin said it's the first pocket park of many pocket parks.

[Homeless – ACLU vs City of Los Angeles: Los Angeles city officials have decided to delay enforcement of an ordinance barring homeless people from sleeping on sidewalks. The compromise between the City Council and the American Civil Liberties Union of Southern California allows for homeless people to sleep on city sidewalks between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. provided they stay at least 10 feet away from the entrance to a building, parking lot or loading dock. The settlement stemmed from a 2003 lawsuit filed against the city by the ACLU on behalf of six homeless people arrested under the 1968 law. A federal appeals court struck down the law last year as cruel and unusual punishment due to the city's housing shortage for the homeless. The new policy will remain in effect until 1,250 units of low-cost housing with services for the homeless are constructed by the city. Half of the units are planned for construction in and around the city's downtown.]

Michael Fong: City Council voted last week unanimously to settle lawsuit with the ACLU to allow people to sleep on the street, 10 feet away from any entrances from 9pm to 6am. It's his understanding that the Mayor is going to sign this and says the LAPD is not happy with it. Kim Benjamin asked if there is any type of housing, i.e., homeless housing to be build that once it's built will sunset this "Sleep for free on the streets" ordinance. Downtown will bear the brunt. John Saslow is a volunteer for LAPD, and says that they have already been following the guidelines and what's been happening will continue to happen so it won't change a lot. The homeless are also allowed to put up a tent between 9pm and 6am. The LAPD is not allowed to move people along. John Saslow says it's a personal property issue; their carts, clothes etc. are their personal property. Russell Brown says it's a humanitarian crisis and how do we deal with the homeless. Kim recommends that he and Russell Brown get together and talk about the issue, as we have 120 days for action. Brian Kito asked if the sleep zones are still in place until this is adopted? John Saslow says it is already being used as policy now by the LAPD. Agendize for next meeting for discussion and action.

[Quimby Fees: Assessments paid by developers of residential projects citywide to help offset the density impacts of development. Charged on a per-unit basis and collected and administered by the city's Recreation and Parks Department, the funds must be used for park projects within two miles of where they are gathered.]

Russell Brown: Issues: Quimby fees of 40 million dollars, DLANC has asked for audit to see where money is going. Kim Benjamin said that the City doesn't seem to have a plan to implement the use of these funds. Russell Brown said DLANC will spearhead a public park at Grand Ave. LA LIVE opens tomorrow with Dixie Chicks. 2nd Thursday Art Walk is exploding, 30 galleries are open. DLANC Planning Committee is very active, meets for 3 to 4 hours. Filming is a huge issue; DLANC has a 20 person task force and going out to the public very quickly. This includes all of downtown with a carve out for Broadway Entertainment zone. Russell also said the DLANC wants to work with the HCNC on the River park. Legislation just passed by Governor for improvement parks, and we may want to consider doing cat parks. He asked how we create trolley systems and pedestrian pathways? Kim Benjamin thanked Russell Brown and reiterated they should get together to discuss areas of common interests and action.

2. Public Comments for youths and seniors: 5 minutes

Raymond Yu made announcements about upcoming city events and events specifically in the HCNC area.

3. Approval of Minutes September 25, 2007 – Jose Luis Sedano

Don Toy made motion to approve minutes and Guiding Principals with these corrections: Guiding Principals: add "subject to meaningful community input & participation, public hearings where applicable, and city approval as required" to items #3 and #14. Alan Kumamoto seconded. Motion approved unanimously.

Amended Guiding Principals attached, page 6.

Motion to limit meetings to no later than 9pm, except as otherwise provided by the bylaws for emergency meetings called for by the president, made by John Saslow and seconded by Alan Kumamoto. Approved unanimously.

4. Vacant Board Seats – Discussion and Action

4a. At-Large Youth: Martin Farfan is looking for a junior at Cathedral High School.

4a1. Change in bylaws on definition of youth position, expand age from 16-17 to 17-20.

Exec Committee recommended and voted unanimously to expand youth age from 17 to 20. If acceptable with the Board would like to be agendized for next meeting for action. **Motion made to expand Youth age from 17 to 20. Don Toy amended motion to 15-20 and part of the community. Motion made by Don Toy and seconded by Tim Keating. Approved unanimously. Post and Agendize for next meeting.**

4b. Little Tokyo Resident: will post again

4c. Replacing the vacant executive board seat of Mr. Nozaki

Gay Yuen has said she'd accept if called to serve as the 4th VP. **Motion to seat Gay Yuen as 4th VP made by Alan Kumamoto and seconded by Danny Young. Motion approved unanimously.**

5. President's Report & Action Items. Kim Benjamin

5a. El Pueblo Revitalization / Development Project.

El Pueblo was previously approved by full board. Project is moving forward and have a motion going before the city for creating a river type taskforce. Hope motion to be finalized in next 90 to 100 days then will go thru normal process of the city to have a full task force.

5b. MTA Call for Projects update. [The MTA Call for Projects provides an opportunity for the CRA to seek funding for streetscape-related projects and Transportation Demand Management (TDM) projects that address traffic congestion issues, getting people out of their cars, and promoting public transit. See attached, pages 7 & 8.]

Mr. Curtis M. Gibbs, Sr. Resource Development Officer of the CRA. Kim Benjamin introduced Mr. Curt Gibbs. Mr. Gibbs is in the downtown region and reports directly to the downtown region director. MTA just approved their 2007 call for projects. 17 grant applications, 7 were approved and 5 are for the downtown region and 3 are in the HCNC area.

5b1. Caesar Chavez Transit Corridor: Street Scape, mediums, bus stops, trees. See F1611, pg 7.

5b2. Transportation Demonstration Project, 820K to do a remode project. Electric vehicles, Pedi cabs, green transportation to take people from Union Station to Civic Center area. See F1704, pg 8.

5b3. Submitted by Bureau street services, Solano Canyon-Zanja Madre-Chinatown-Broadway Bus Stop Improvements: to make them safe and attractive, from CMac Fund, 840K by Bureau Street Services. Solano Canyon HCNC members will be asked to be part of the design process. See F1662, pg 8.

5b4. Submitted by County of LA for a project restore: Wayfinding and pedestrian pathways from Union Station and around El Pueblo. 4.4 million dollars to match and a 821K match, a 10 million dollar project. See F1634 and F1718, pg 7.

5b5. ExperienceLA.com is a partnership of CRA/LA and the LA County Arts Commission along with LA, Inc., The Convention and Visitors Bureau, and the City of Los Angeles Department of Cultural Affairs. It was originally funded from the 2001 MTA Call for Projects with matching funds from the City of LA. Major additional funding has come from the LA County Arts Commission. CRA has provided limited funding over the last fiscal year and this fiscal year to bridge upcoming Metro funding for FY 2009 coming from the 2007 MTA Call for Projects. Metro funded the project to promote using public transit to get to cultural destinations. Phase 2 to bring people into Chinatown, Little Tokyo and El Pueblo, \$220K.

5b6. Redevelopment Agency to put Wifi internet service on the Metro Gold Line trains and stations. Will work with Metro on security and provide for the expansion of WiFi from Little Tokyo into the Arts District. Very exciting project. 1 million dollar project. Will be rolled into City of Los Angeles WiFi. See F1725, pg 8. HCNC gave grant to Little Tokyo for the security cameras, project now before Police Department for review. They will soon be delivering the cameras to Little Tokyo and speaking with Police Department about where to place the cameras.

Don Toy asked Mr. Gibbs to please make sure there was community participation. Mr. Gibbs went over the steps they've taken and will take to assure community participation. Ron Fong thanked Mr. Gibbs for the help with projects in Little Tokyo. CRA and LADOT has augmented a number of pedestrian improvements to improve the pedestrian environment. Kim Benjamin thanked Mr. Gibbs for the entire HCNC.

5c. CRA North Chinatown Industrial Specific Plan: postponed discussion.

5d. River Plan City Approval: postponed discussion.

5e. Dan Reza: Solano Canyon Community Park Project update. HCNC Grant: \$15,000. Treasurer turned in paperwork to DONE and once they receive funds can go ahead with monument. Solano Canyon will have a public ceremony and there will be a small plaque saying sponsored by the HCNC and the date. The Monument sign will be 10 feet wide by 5 feet high. So far budget came in at under \$13,500. The Monument was designed by an artist who lives in the community and they are also using a local landscape architect to design the landscape. Will be graffiti proof and have a streetlight over it.

5f. Misc: Development Project updates and HCNC Sponsored Community Project updates and action items for Arts District, Chinatown, El Pueblo, Little Tokyo, Solano Canyon, and Victor Heights CALL FOR PROJECTS. Santa Fe One was approved.

6. Action Committee, Brian Kito: Discussion and action items on neighborhood projects and expenditures:

Action Committee met on 10/11. Went over 1st and Alameda presentation. Committee decided not to take a position until after November 2nd when the proposals are due.

Discussion of creating a review committee on real estate developments and to help get more people to step up to the plate.

6a. Tim Keating: Arts District Report for LaDAD/Padua Playwrights – Demonstration Project Community Art Center for Downtown Arts District. HCNC Grant: \$11,500. This will be rescinded and a new one proposed as they lost the space, it was sold and they are looking for another site, but cannot find one in Arts District. They have negotiated with One Santa Fe for 5,000 sq ft permanent space for \$1/year for 10 years. But still need a temporary space. Hope to find one in the next month. Kim Benjamin said that the One Santa Fe space Tim has secured equals a donation of 1 to 2 million dollars (the value of the 5,000 square feet). Note per David Nagano that though the Arts District has rescinded the project the HCNC has not rescinded the monies, the grant is still in force for the Arts District. The funds are still in the budget for the Arts District project when they find a temporary space.

6b. Brian Kito: Little Tokyo Security Cameras Project Report. HCNC Grant: \$22,600. Postponed.

6c. Ryan Timmreck: Victor Heights Neighborhood Watch Signs Project Report. HCNC Grant: \$3,000. Ryan: project went over the \$3,000 by \$123.75. Put Action item on next agenda for the extra \$123.75.

Press conferences: Brian Kito asked everyone to contact him with ideas of how to publicize the HCNC projects.

General discussion with the idea of creating HCNC Decals. David Nagano said that we can approve extra money for HCNC Decals, he will get a quote. Jose Sedano noted that Color Graphics Bureau is right by our new temporary HCNC office. Howard Fink mentioned that there are specific rules on how and where we can put decals so need to follow the restrictions and asked that we check. Gabriella Quintana said we can go through DONE to get the proper seal for the decals, said Jack Mendez of DONE is the person to contact.

Alicia Brown asked if anyone had approached Father Boyle to come to the HCNC meetings since the Homeboy Industries is in our area. California Endowment, the offer was made at their big reception to have the HCNC meeting there, Kim Benjamin directed Anne Walrath to check with them regarding having a future HCNC Board meeting at their site and also directed her to check with Tom Minkler regarding website posting of the HCNC board meetings.

David Nagano talked about the plaque in Little Tokyo they're going to put in front of the Little Tokyo tree once Little Tokyo obtains historic status for the tree. It's a huge tree and there are pictures of it at 3 feet and it's now over 100 feet tall. The plaque will cost between \$500 to \$800 dollars and the community may also put a park around the tree. Maybe the community can develop a pocket park to complement the proposed Art Park to be built around the Veteran's memorial. David wants the HCNC to sponsor the plaque. The tree is near the Frank Gerry Scaffold, Central and First Street, pedestrian walkway.

Horses: DLANC donated a horse to the LAPD, the horse didn't work out but they received a lot of publicity. HCNC wants to activate Radio Hill down to LA State Historic Park (the old Corn Fields) with 2 horses, then down Alameda to El Pueblo. Kim Benjamin is recommending that the HCNC sponsor a horse for the LAPD. Gabriella Quintana said we need to check with Kevin McNeely or Steve Balk about where they can house the horses first.

6d. Update and action on any project funding previously discussed at the last 4 board meetings not previously approved. Discussion postponed.

6d1. Youth Outreach: \$3,000 previously approved. Discussion postponed.

6d2. At-Large contingent community programs that cover whole HCNC: \$5,000 previously approved. Discussion postponed.

6d3. Little Tokyo: map of Little Tokyo that will identify historic sites: Discussion postponed.

6d4. Chinatown Signage project: Discussion postponed.

6e. LA City's Alameda & 1st RFP: Ron Fong. The City has issued an RFP for a 4.5 acre site at Alameda & First Streets. It is not known how many bids will be submitted. Little Tokyo Service Center is a member of one team that will be submitting a bid. Proposals are due Nov 2nd, after which we can look at them and vet them and make a recommendation on one of them. Marie Rumsey has said they won't have their first meeting until 2008. Finalists about January or February.

- 6f. 4th Street Lofts Project, Arts District: Gordon A. Olschlager, Nakada & Assoc., AIA Senior Associate, and Kathleen Kim & Jeanmarie Hance, KOR Group (4 minutes). 405 S Mateo Street & 1003 E 4th Place. Mateo runs North and South. Community has issues and they are working through the issues. Public hearing is on November 10th. Per Tim Keating Laraba heard this report and will vote at next meeting on November 5th, vote looks 50-50. Kim Benjamin recommended that John Saslow and Tim Keating be point persons on this project and come back with recommendation. Asked that they email us the November 5th meeting schedule and the Arts District caucus and Kim Benjamin and Brian Kito will go. If caucus approves will get letter of support. Kathleen says it's in the preliminary stages, it's a 2010 project. See attachments, pages 9 thru 12.
- 6g. East West Players Proposal: Lisa Tang / Tim Dang. Postponed.
7. Treasurer's Report: David Nagano: See attached, page 9.
8. Alternative Technologies for waste disposal: Alan Kumamoto & guest. Alan met with them, has no recommendations.
9. Temporary HCNC Office space: Since DONE took back their office, the HCNC office has been moved to 1640 North Spring Street, Los Angeles, CA 90012, Ph: 562-298-2342. HCNC is hosted front desk of Sedano Media Group/LatinoGraduate.net for now.
10. DWP Rate Hike: Jack Humphreville: DWP Oversight Comm. 8 ½ % rate increase on power but it's more like 23% increase. We all agree with conservation and a clean environment but the increase and the structure are both prohibitive. Asking NC to follow the recommendation of the DWP Oversight Executive Committee to not approve the rate hike. DWP needs to have an independent Oversight Agency. DWP is audited by a big accounting firm and the audit will be ready in about a month but there is no operational auditing so there is a need for an independent Oversight Agency. Kim Benjamin suggests this goes to the Action Committee for recommendation. Alan Kumamoto asked the time frame: Council will see it at the end of this month. DWP can funnel money to the city which makes the hike suspect.
11. City of Los Angeles HIV/AIDS Survey by Vital Research: Tamara Nelson, Project Coordinator: Postponed to next meeting.
12. Public Comments: Kim Benjamin asked for public comments, there was no response.
13. Next Meeting & Announcements, change in meetings dates/times, posting locations and process, action items, possible bylaw change. Next meeting is December 11th. Location TBD.

Guiding Principals for the HCNC 2007 / 2008

- 1) Support the creation of Parking Improvement Districts to improve traffic patterns, activate pedestrian connections and reduce parking fees at public meters; support Business Improvement Districts that support improved security, marketing and street improvements as well as street cleaning, subject to the approval of the members that would pay assessments into such a district.
- 2) Support planting of new trees, install covered tree wells, improve sidewalks, new pedestrian benches and related street art along with improved pedestrian lighting and improved cross walks throughout HCNC. Support community art and art related projects.
- 3) Support mixed use development for projects requesting variances to have 20% or more affordable housing and we encourage by-right projects to have 10% affordable housing. We support expedited city applications for all housing and mixed use projects subject to meaningful community input & participation, public hearings where applicable, and city approval as required.
- 4) Support LA River Revitalization subject to meaningful community input & participation, public hearings where applicable, and city approval as required.
- 5) Support Transfer of Floor Area Rights (TFAR) between private and other parties subject to meaningful community input & participation, public hearings where applicable, and city approval as required.
- 6) Support reduced parking requirements on new housing or adaptive reuse projects within HCNC subject to meaningful community input & participation, public hearings where applicable, and city approval as required.
- 7) Call for city to improve/expand existing and build new elementary and middle schools in HCNC.
- 8) Creation of Pocket Parks in HCNC.
- 9) Support creation of historic and cultural resources within HCNC.
- 10) Support change in use of M zoned properties to allow for mixed use and or housing subject to meaningful community input & participation, public hearings where applicable, and city approval as required.

Metro 2007 Call for Projects – Recommended Projects in the HCNC Area – Inflated in \$000's**F1634: EI Pueblo Pedestrian Improvements Phase I, II, III, IV -Los Angeles County**

The funds will be used for design and construction. The project includes enhanced pedestrian amenities to complete a pedestrian system through the EI Pueblo District and to other landmarks in the Downtown Los Angeles Area. The project will include pedestrian walkways including switchback walkways up to the Fort Moore area, pocket parks up the switchbacks, decorative pavers, landscaping and hardscape, installation of water features, an irrigation system, and an elevator and curb ramps that fully comply with ADA regulations, The project is located between the Historic EI Pueblo de Los Angeles and the general area west to Fort Moore and Hill Street. The wayfinding signage element of this project is contained in the TDM Mode as project #F1718.

Total Project Cost: \$12,260
Recommended funding: \$5,474

Local match commitment: \$7,289 = 57% of project cost recommended for funding

F1718: EI Pueblo Pedestrian Improvements Phase I, II, III, & IV (Wayfinding signs ONLY) - Los Angeles County

The wayfinding portion of this project is a component of a larger project to enhance pedestrian movement in the downtown area signage portion of Pedestrian Project #F1640 - EI Pueblo Pedestrian Improvements Phase I, II, III, & IV. This is for the design and construction of wayfinding signs that tell the history of the EI Pueblo District and direct pedestrian movement to various City landmarks in Downtown Los Angeles. The signs will blend in with the current architecture of the area, The project will extend west from Alameda Street to Hill Street for approximately 2000 feet north-south cross section of approximately 100 feet. There are 29 locations which include, but are not limited to streets, State historic parks, Union Station, Campo Santo, La Plaza Cultural, cross walks, Fort Moore Memorial and parking lots on Broadway Avenue. Approximately 20-40 signs will be installed depending on the pedestrian movement and enhancement.

Total project cost (this mode only): \$1,746
Recommended funding: \$873

Local match commitment: \$873 = 50% of project cost recommended for funding

F1611: Cesar Chavez Transit Corridor (110 Fwy. to Alameda) - City of Los Angeles

The funds will be used for design and construction. This project will install pedestrian, transit amenities including bus stop gardens at three intersections, new pedestrian lighting, and street trees in a landscaped parkway, wayfinding signage, transit shelters, paving, and trash receptacles.

Total project cost: \$2,144
Recommended funding: \$1,692

Local match commitment: \$658 = 28% of project cost recommended for funding

F1615: Eastside light Rail Pedestrian linkage - City of Los Angeles

The funds will be used for design and construction. The project includes: street trees with decorative tree wells, decorative sidewalks, pedestrian lights, stamped crosswalks, bicycle racks, trash receptacles, street furniture, and improved connections to access ramps. This project will improve and enhance 1st Street between Alameda Street to Lorena Street, a length of approximately 2.7 miles. Most of the improvements will be focused within 1) mile of each of the Metro Gold Line stations under construction, including environments with active bus lines.

Total Project Cost: \$3,112
Recommended funding: \$2,392

Local match commitment: \$598 = 20% of project cost recommended for funding

F1662: Solano Canyon-Zanja Madre-Chinatown-Broadway Bus Stop Improvements-City of Los Angeles

The funds will be used for design and construction. This project will improve 8 bus stops along Broadway from Bernard Street to Solano Avenue, with street furniture and landscaping, increasing accessibility, transfers and transit use.

Total Project Cost: \$1,117
Recommended funding: \$892
Local match commitment: \$223 = 20% of project cost recommended for funding

F1704: Downtown LA Alternative Green Transit modes Trial Program - City of Los Angeles

This project will offer an innovative and emission-free alternative to commuters for the last mile of travel between Union Station and the Civic Center area. The proposed project will provide electric-motor assisted two-passenger bicycle-transit type vehicles and three passenger Neighborhood Electric Vehicles (NEV), The Green Transit modes will consist of approximately 30 vehicles (i.e., 15 passenger-modified bicycles that can transport 2 riders and is NEV that can transport 3 riders), For example, vehicles can operate on a route leaving from the west entry of Union Station and travel in a circuit to a location on Los Angeles Street between Temple and 1st Street and on Main Street between Temple and 1st Street near the east entrance to City Hall and return to Union Station. Before the MOU/LOA is executed all agencies involved need to come to agreement as to the appropriate fixed route for this service.

Total project cost: \$997
Recommended funding: \$821
Local match commitment: \$205 = 20.5% of project cost recommended for funding

F1725: WiFi on Metro Gold line, Chinatown & Little Tokyo/Arts District - City of Los Angeles

This project will provide WiFi Internet service on the Metro Gold Line trains and stations to attract new riders. It will also include the Metro Gold Line Eastside Extension only. A pre-agreement outlining specific conditions of project implementation will be required prior to Metro and the project sponsor entering into the MOU JLOA to ensure that the local match commitment is met.
